I am grateful for the opportunity to extend greetings to the students, faculty, and friends of Cullman High School.





The court between the east and west wings of New Main during lunch.






THE HISTORY OF DOWLING EXTENSION



LUNCH ROOM WORKERS








LIBRARY






















In March the Glee Club will travel to Florence to participate with other glee clubs in North Alabama for singing and music ability.




Coach Cain, in his first coaching job here at C. H. S., has been here for two years. He coaches the football team backfield, teaches tackling, blocking, handling the ball and running.


GUNTERSVILLE














SWIMMING

The pool is open to the public during the summer.





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
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HISTORY OF CULLMAN

Colonel John G. Kullmann came here in 1873 to start a colony of German immigrant farmers. Kullmann, himself a German refugee who had lost a fortune in the Dano-German war, dreamed of a thriving colony of thrifty hard-working tillers of the soil.

When Colonel Kullmann brought his fellow Germans here from Cincinnati, there were only a few other persons living in what is now Cullman County.

Because of unproductive land, early settlers had passed this area up; however after taking one look at the region Kullmann decided it was the place for his colony.

The land had been made available by the old North and South Railroad, presently L & N. The colony chose 349,000 acres along the newly completed railroad link between birmingham and Decatur. Backed by the railorad, Kullmann brought the first settlers, which consisted of five families and a bachelor from Cincinnati in 1873.


Soon joined by other families, the newcomers started laying out their colony. They selected their town site, erected a railroad depot, a hotel, two churches, and a store. A log cabin for each family was also erected. They called their colony Cullman. In 1877 the state Legislature created a new county around Cullman, thus adding 100,000 acres. When it came to adding the county seat, Cullman had competition from a town called Gilmer, now called Hanceville. Although Hanceville was larger than Cullman, it was Cullman who won out. Given its new status, the farm colony continued to grow and Colonel Kullmann continued to bring more German immigrants to Cullman county, which by 1880 contained 6455 persons.

Before he died in 1895 at the age of 70, Colonel John G. Kullmann had brought to Cullman several thousand immigrants.

Today this county compares favorably with any county in the State and in some respects is years ahead.

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

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
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
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
