

Entering Paths That


Unit B

Pave The Way To Understanding






The new cafeteria with its modern appliances, is as pleasant for the lunchroom staff as it is for the students.

Students enjoying the new stadium during a pep rally before the Arab football game.


The first football game was held on September 8th in the new stadium sponsored by the Quarterback Club. This stadium cost the people of Cullman approximately \$100,000.




Graduating from the University of Alabama with a B.A. degree, Miss Nancy Talley teaches English and German. This is her first year at C.H.S.

History





Physics and biology teacher, Mr. John McLure, holds a B.S. and a M.A. from the University of Alabama. He enjoys sports, hunting, and fishing.




Science















score. The conversion was also good.


On the third outing, the 'Cats went 84 yards on 9 plays for the T.D. with the conversion carrying true, and the result was 21-0.














