## Paths That

The administration building is the real backbone of Cullman High School. Its central location cuts down traffic problems. Completely air-conditioned, this new building features private offices for the Principal and Assistant Principal; a separate room for files and records; a clinic, which is being temporarily used as a conference room during school hours.


Two biology rooms, a physics room, a chemistry laboratory, and a general science building. The new greenhouse which will be used for individual science projects and for culturing plants for biology classes is only one of the features of this building.

Unit B


A modern language laboratory in Unit B, used by the French, Spanish, and German students, is one improvement in the new academic buildings. Unit $A$ has an English laboratory used by the Journalism Class in publishing the Southerner and the Hilight. Another new feature is individual student lockers. There are fourteen classrooms in these two buildings.
