





Cullman High School first served the students of Cullman and Cullman County as a County High School. Later is was sold to the City of Cullman to be used as a city school. The New Cullman Senior High School, built in 1959 to relieve the crowded conditions of the old school, might truly be known as a "School of the Space Age". Consisting of ten modern buildings spread over 18 acres, the school is one of the newest and most modern in the State. To aid in helping students reach their highest potential, classes in English,





Faye Phillips, a second year home economics student, was selected by the FHA Club as Miss FHA. A winning personality and excellent work in home economics are important factors in this contest.




Learning prepares leaders for the Space Age






Good English,




Science "Zooms" students into the space age

Assistant Principal Charles McNutt teaches chemistry and physics. Mr. McNutt holds B.S. and M.Ed. degrees from Auburn.








Graduating from Auburn University with a B.S. degree, Mr. Bill Bowling teaches biology. His hobbies are hunting and fishing.














