


The school representative is selected by popular vote of the Senior Class and is judged on poise, appearance, and personality.








HOMECOMING QUEEN




FOOTBALL COACHES

The first quarter was all Walker with the Vikings making a serious threat against a somewhat surprised Bearcat defense. However, the second and third quarters were all Cullman during which the Bearcats claimed three trips into the end zone. 



The Sophomore year is the first year that students participate in activities as a class.








